Personal Endings, Passive

	Singular	Plural
1st Person	-or	-mur
2nd Person	-ris	-mini
3rd Person	-tur	-ntur

From the Philosophers handbook: A cane non mango saepe tenetur aper.
A boar is often held by a not large dog.

Present Passive, First Conjugation

vocor I am called/ I am being called

vocaris you are called/ you are being called

vocatur he (she, it) is called/ he (she, it) is being called

vocamur we are called/ we are being called

vocamini you are called/ you are being called

vocantur they are called/ they are being called

Imperfect Passive, First Conjugation

vocabar	I was being called	vocabamur	we were being called
vocabaris	you were being called	vocabamini	you (pl.) were being called
vocabatur	he was being called	vocabantur	they were being called

Future Passive, First Conjugation

vocabor	I shall be called	vocabimur	we shall be called
vocaberis	you will be called	vocabimini	you (pl.) will be called
vocabitur	he will be called	vocabuntur	they will be called

Derivatives

Copia/ supply; plenty; opportunity—

Fama/ rumor, report; reputation— defamation, defamatory, defame, defamer

Ira/ anger, rage— ireful, irascible, irritate, irascibility

Telum/ weapon, spear—

Laetus/ joyful, glad—

Novus/ new— innovate, innovation, innovative, novel, novice

Paratus/ ready, prepared

Clamo/ shout— exclamation, exclamatory, acclaim

Demonstro/ point out, show— demonstrate, demonstration, demonstrator

Laboro/ toil, suffer— belabor, collaborate, elaborate

Libero/ free, set— liberate, liberation, liberty

Servo/ save; keep, guard— preserve, preservation, preservative

Rursus/ back; again—

Semper/ always, continually; still— sempiternal
